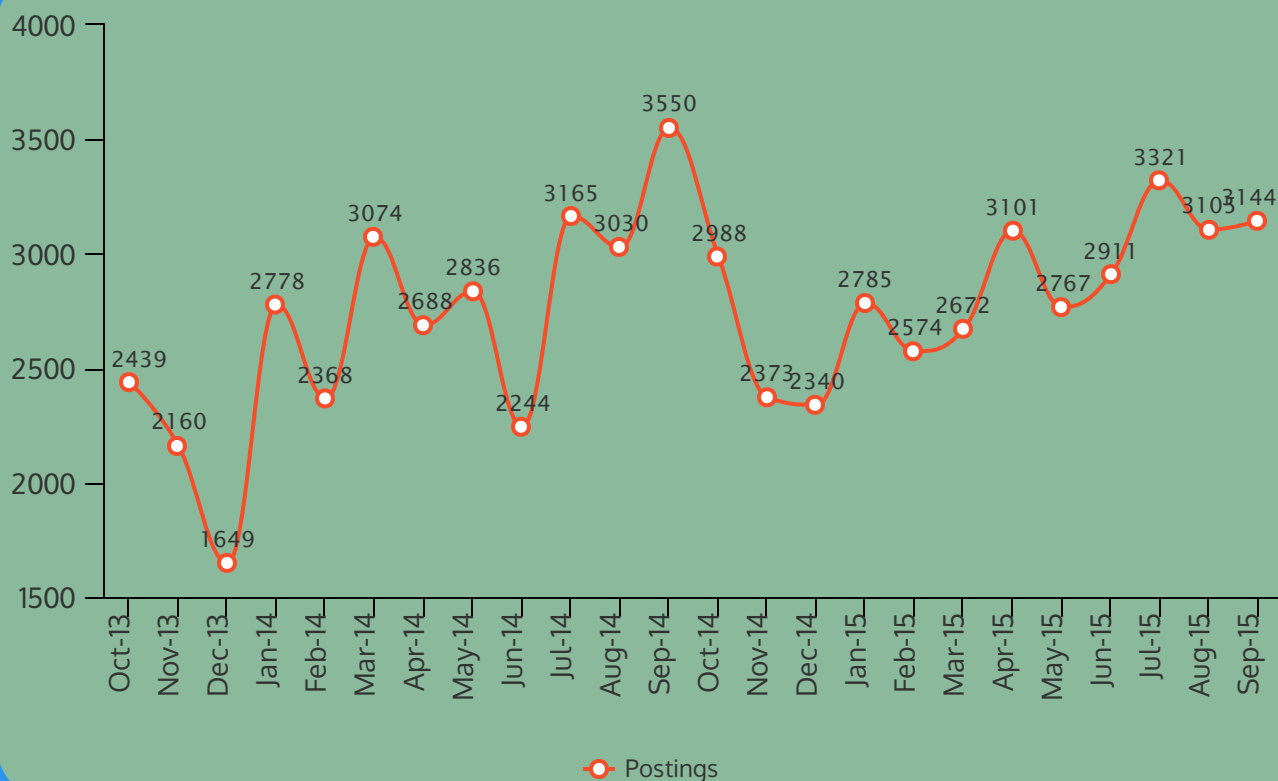

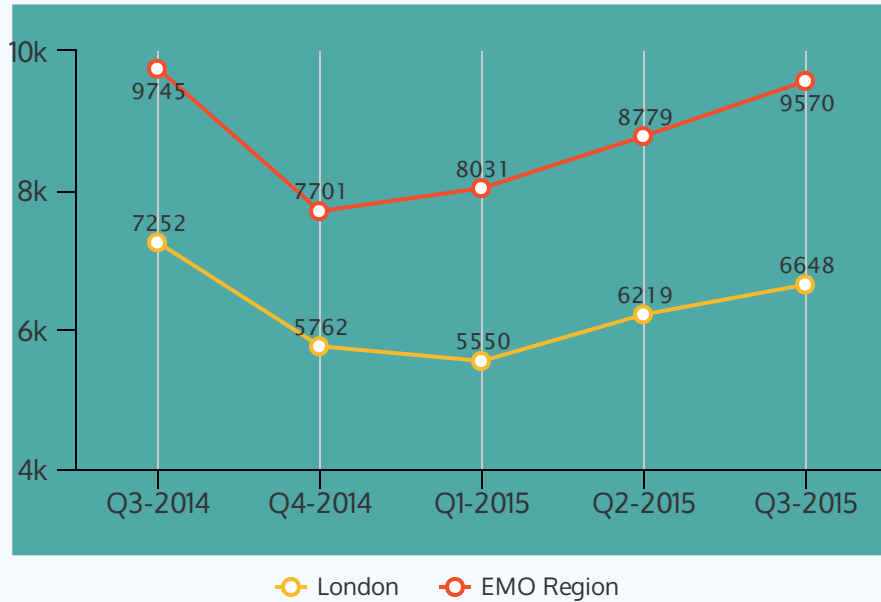

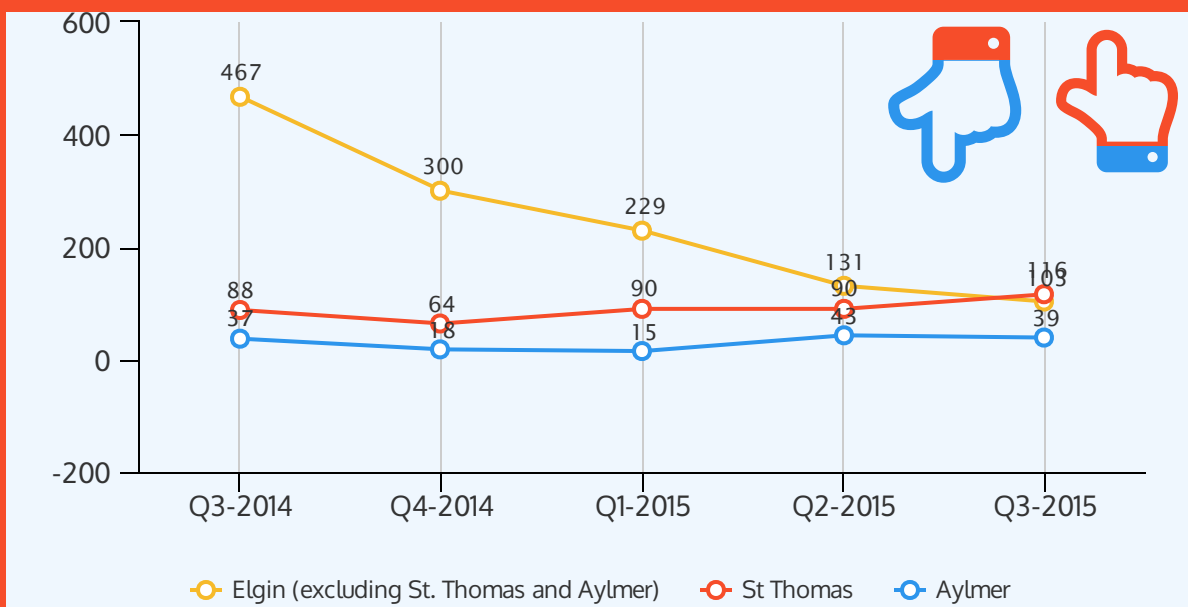
By Location

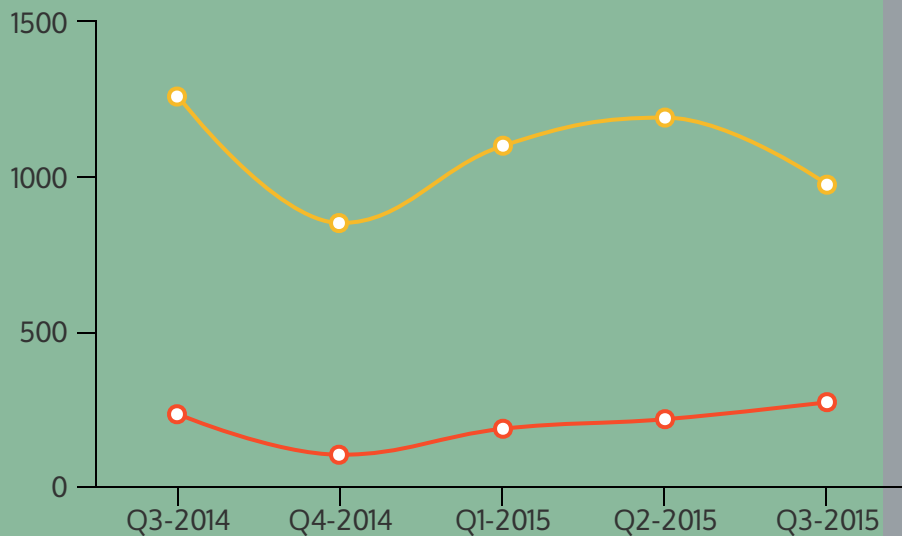
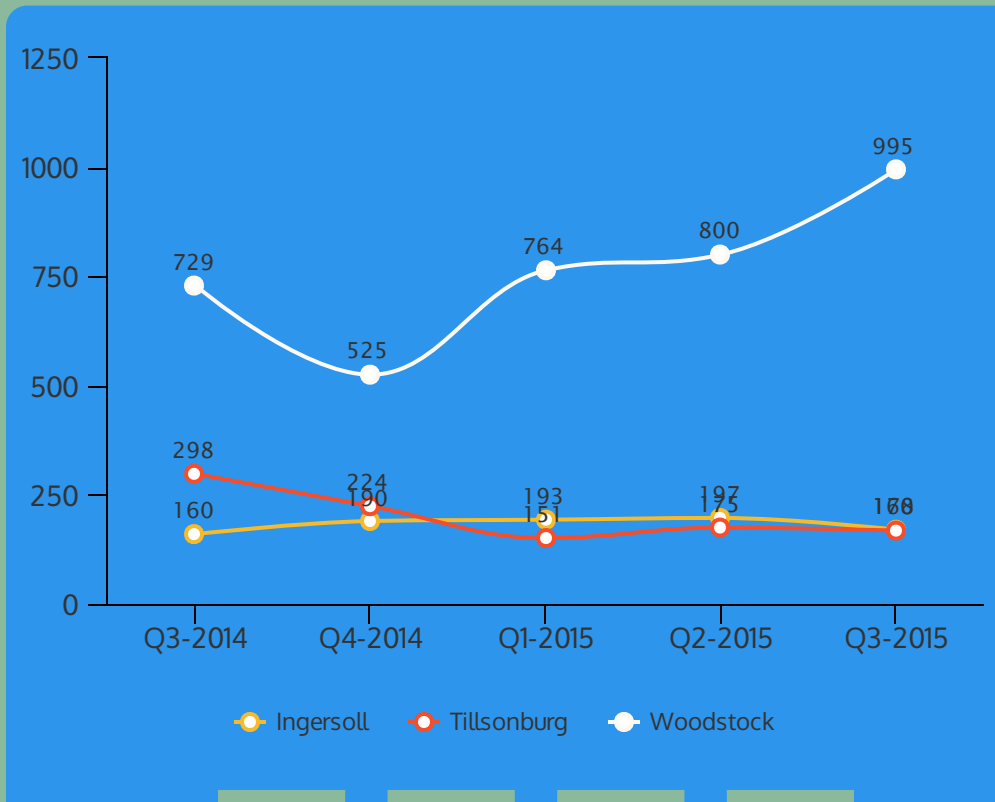
In Woodstock, during Q3-2015: 24.4% increase in postings relative to Q2-2015 and 35.6% growth in postings relative to Q3-2014



In Tillsonburg, during Q3-2015: 4% drop in postings relative to Q2-2015 and 43.6% drop in postings relative to Q3-2014



In Ingersoll, during Q3-2015: 13.7% drop in postings relative to Q2-2015 and 6.3% growth in postings relative to Q3-2014



In Oxford-Middlesex region, during Q3-2015: 18.2% drop in postings relative to Q2-2015 and 22.6% drop in postings relative to Q3-2014



In Strathroy, during Q3-2015: 25.5% growth in postings relative to Q2-2015 and 16.8% growth in postings relative to Q3-2014

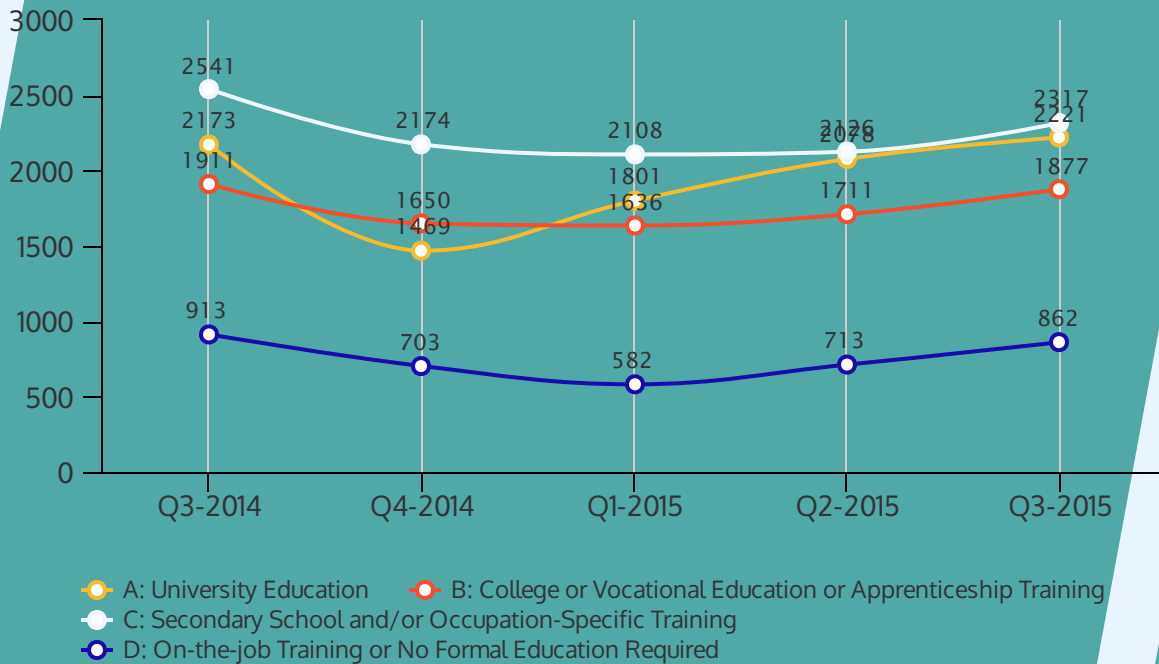

Q3 of 2015 relative to Q3 of 2014: drop in the number of postings for all skill level categories excepting the "University Education" category



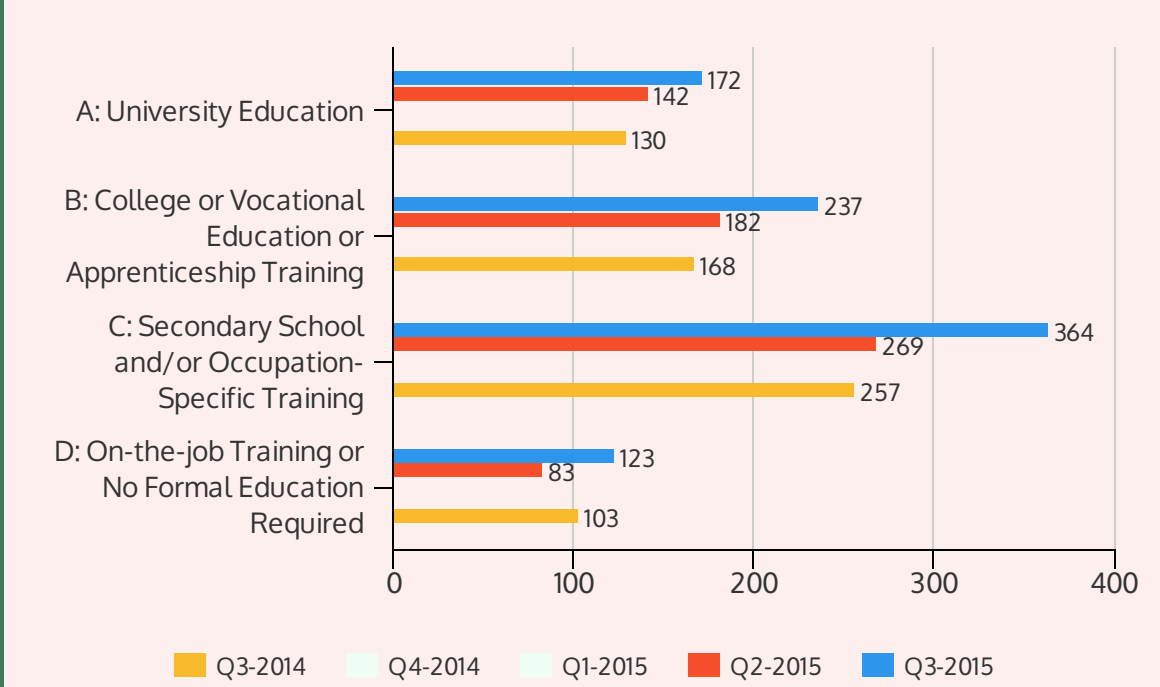

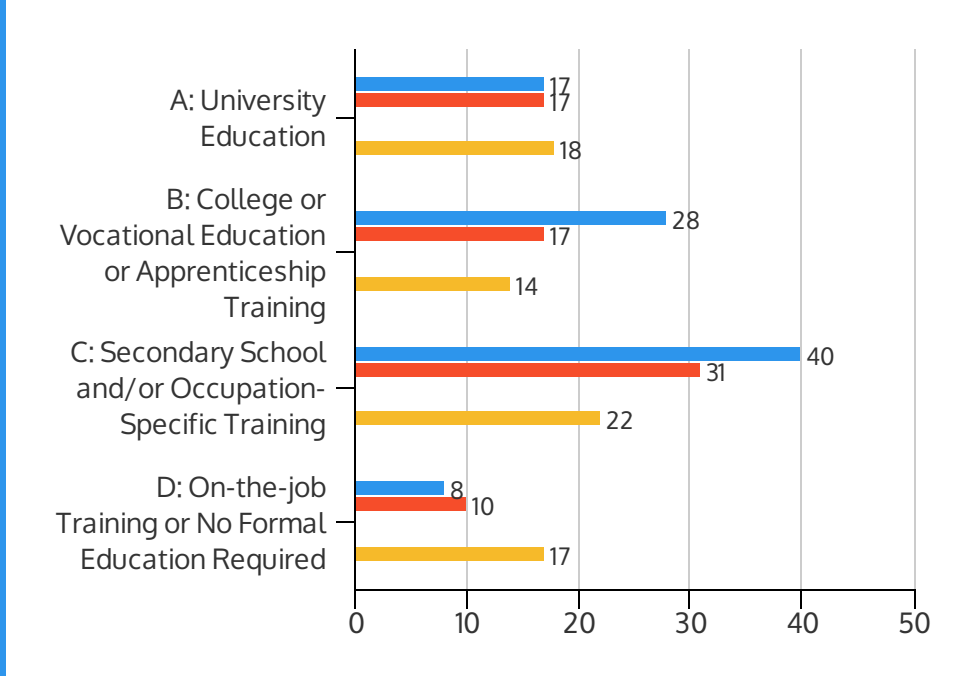

Growth in the no. of postings requiring "B: College or Vocational Education or Apprenticeship Training," or "C: Secondary School and/or Occupation Specific Training"



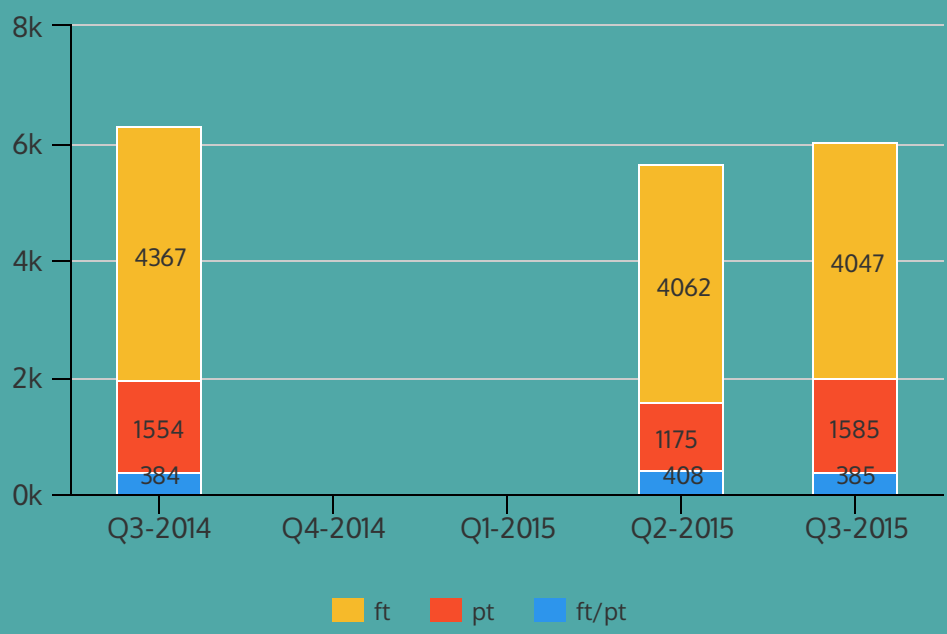

Marginal growth in the postings associated to each job type category excepting the "full-time" (ft)

Quarterly, Q2 vs. Q3

- 0.4% drop in the full-time job postings
- 34.9% growth in the part-time job postings
- 5.6% drop in the full-time/part-time

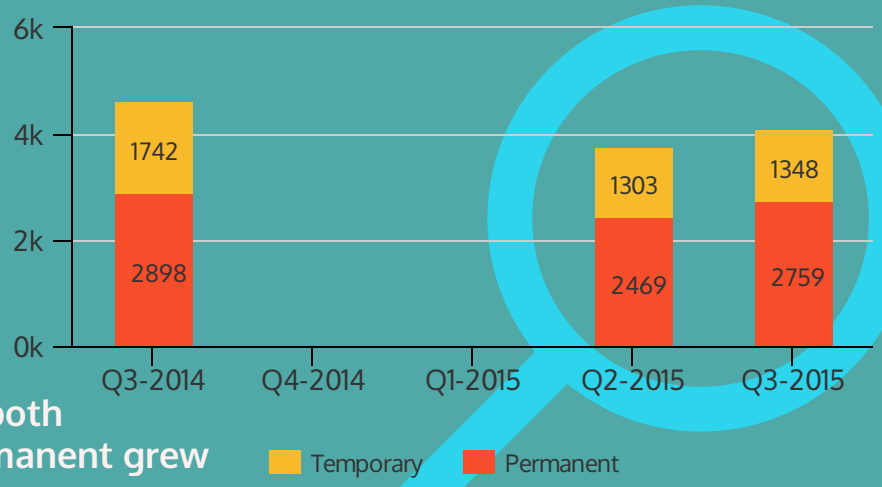

- No. of postings associated to both categories temporary and permanent grew

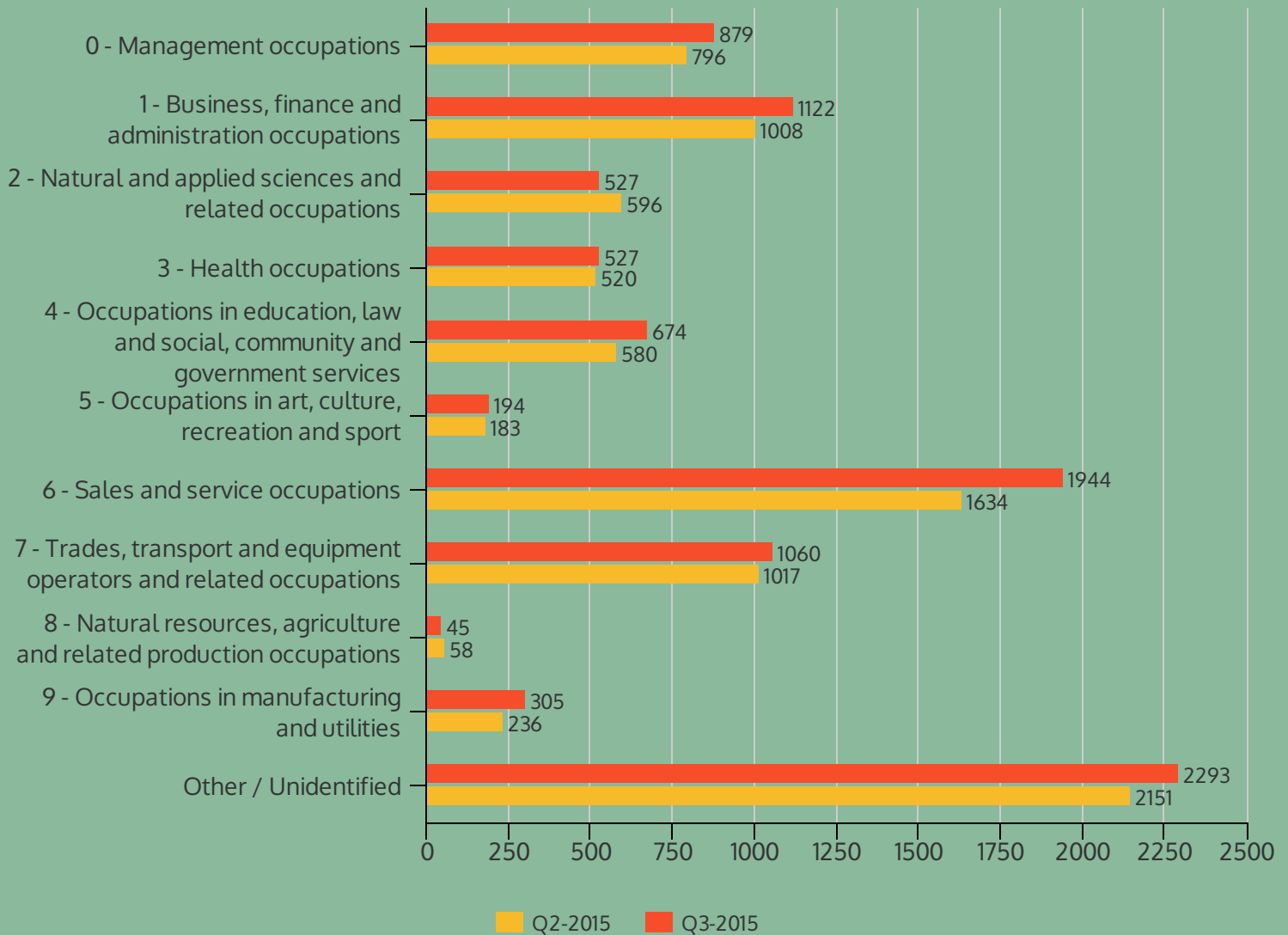

Quarterly growth in the no. of postings associated to all occupational categories excepting "Natural and applied sciences and related occupations" and "Natural resources, agriculture and related production occupations"

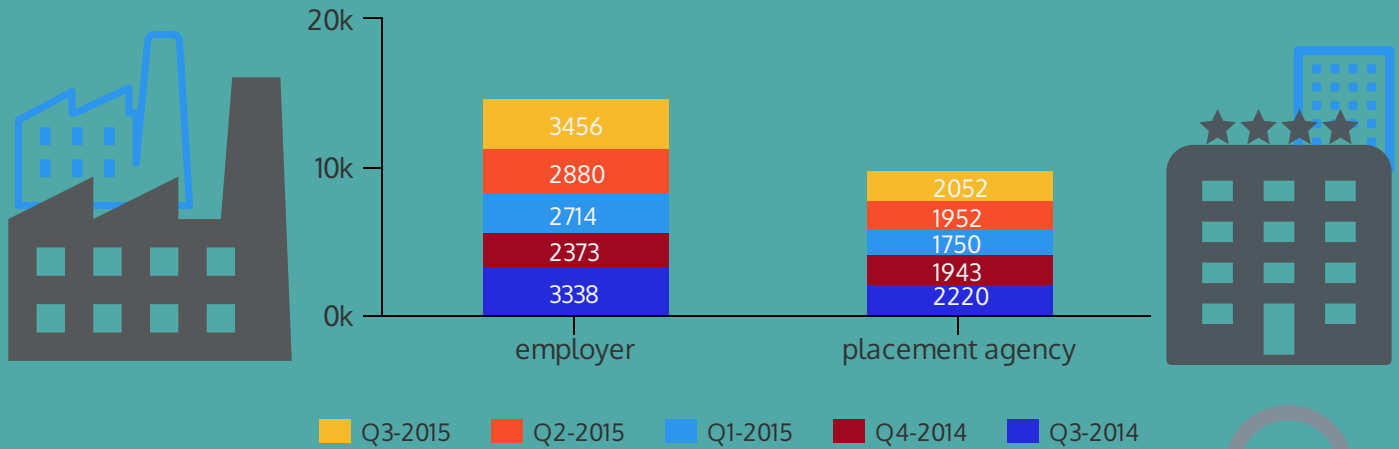
The number of internet job postings associated to "Occupations in manufacturing and utilities" grew the fastest relative to prior quarter, 29.2%. Further, the number of postings associated to "Sales and service occupations" grew fast too (18.9%) relative to prior quarter followed closely by the postings related to "Occupations in education, law and social, community and government services," which grew by

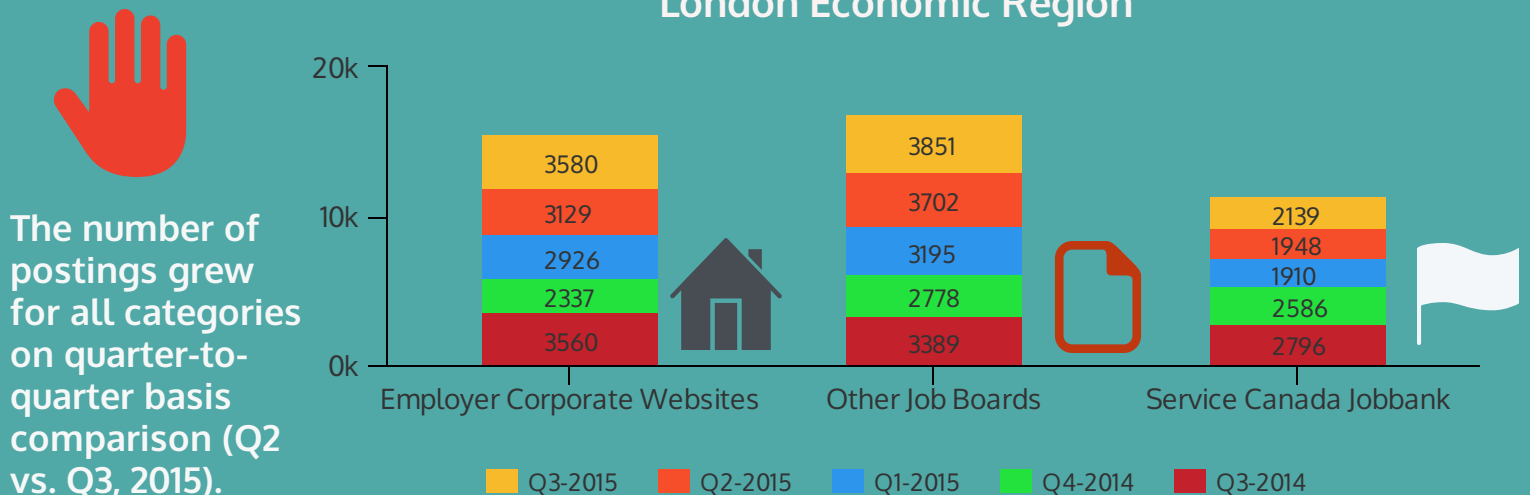


On a quarter-to-quarter comparison the number of postings for both categories grew, whereas on over-a-year comparison the number of postings sourced by placement agencies had dropped by 7.6%
